HEADMASTER'S NOTEBOOK

During my absence the Headmaster's Notebook will generally be written by an ACA administrator. However, in light of reenrollment, we felt that an adaptation of Michael Collie's recent article in "WNC Parent" on funding private education would be especially helpful. We recognize that choosing ACA is a financial commitment and a sacrifice for many of you. Michael is an ACA Board Member and a Certified Financial Planner. His article is longer than normal, my hope is that you will be encouraged and benefit from his expertise in this area. - Bill George

Fellow ACA families,

I recently wrote an article for "WNC Parent" that discussed the benefits of a private or Christian education and how families could implement steps that would help offset the costs. As an ACA parent, you already know the irreplaceable value of the education your children receive at ACA. You recognize your obligation to be a steward of the children God has entrusted to you. You understand that this means partnering with an institution committed to helping Christian parents provide their children with an excellent academic education distinguished by a Biblical perspective resulting in a thoroughly Biblical world and life view. Thank God that ACA and its staff continue to fulfill this mission!

We do, however, face challenges in paying for this education. It means financial sacrifice on our part, and it isn't always easy. Implementing the financial steps below can help reduce the financial challenges we face as ACA parents.

Start a Coverdell Educational Savings Account (ESA). The Coverdell ESA, formerly known as the Educational IRA, works similarly to a Roth IRA, except it is geared toward education. Parents can contribute a total of \$2,000 per child per year to this type of account. Like a 529 plan, distributions are tax-free as long as they are used for qualified education expenses, such as tuition, books, fees, etc., at an eligible educational institution. 529 plans and Coverdell ESA's differ in that 529 plan distributions can only be used for post-secondary education (college); Coverdell ESA distributions can be used to fund any public, private or religious school that provides elementary, secondary or post-secondary education.

For example, let's assume that a newborn's parents begin to contribute \$2,000 each year to a Coverdell ESA, and the account earns an average annual rate of return of 8.00%. When the child reaches 6th grade the parents will have made total contributions of \$26,000 and the account will be worth an estimated \$46,430. Let's further assume that beginning the following year, 7th grade, the parents stop making the annual contributions and start taking an annual distribution of \$10,000 to pay for each remaining year's tuition. By the end of 12th grade, the parents will have thus depleted the account balance. Over this period of time, the parents would have contributed \$26,000 (newborn thru 6th grade, \$2,000 per year), taken distributions of \$60,000 (7th grade thru 12th grade, \$10,000 per year) and had tax-free earnings of \$34,000. At a total tax rate of 35%, this results in tax savings of nearly \$12,000!

Review your monthly spending. Financial Planning is defined as the allocation of limited resources to unlimited alternatives. This means that we have only so much money and unlimited choices to spend it on. By ordering your monthly and annual expenses based on your values and priorities, then starting at the top and allocating your income as you go down the list, you ensure that you cover the most important areas first and skip

out on the less important areas. Is this challenging for most families? Most definitely! However, you will never regret having used your resources to meet your God-given priorities. After all, our money is a tool that God gives us to help carry out His purpose in our lives. Most of you went through this process when you initially committed to ACA. Be sure to review these priorities regularly; it will help you remember the value of ACA and reduce the stress caused by the financial challenges.

View it as a financial investment. Each year, millions of dollars are given out in the form of scholarships. Your child will ultimately be more successful and have a greater likelihood of receiving scholarships if they are educated in an environment where they can thrive. ACA employs a guidance counselor to help students explore college scholarship opportunities. With smaller graduating classes, she has the privilege of knowing each of the students personally and has more time to individually guide them in their scholarship search. Ultimately, if the value of the education you are paying for makes your child more likely to obtain scholarship aid, then the expense of the education can be viewed as an investment (because you may pay more for the education now yet pay less for a college education in the future, due to the scholarship aid received).

Inquire about Financial Aid. 33% of ACA families receive financial assistance. The standard procedure requires filling out a confidential financial aid application. Be sure to inquire with the school office early because the aid process usually requires meeting certain deadlines for both re-enrolling and new students.

Educating our children is unquestionably one of our primary objectives as parents. This education doesn't begin or end at school; it begins and ends at home. The ACA family, including both teachers and fellow students, will however have a huge impact on their development. Parental involvement and selecting an educational partner that shares your values and beliefs, as well as a commitment to outstanding educational achievement, as we are blessed to have found in ACA, are critical factors in guiding your children to their full potential.
